Option 1

NO on Prop 27 - Stop the Corporate Online Gambling Proposition

Out-of-state and foreign online gambling corporations are bankrolling Prop 27 on the November 2022 ballot which would legalize a massive expansion of online and mobile sports gambling across California, turning virtually every cellphone, laptop and tablet into a gambling device.

Prop 27 is dangerous - it would undercut voter-approved tribal gaming exclusivity, expose California's most vulnerable communities to increased risks of addiction and underage gambling and shortchange our schools and other critical state priorities. This measure sends 90% of profits into the pockets of out-of-state gambling corporations without creating new jobs or making any real investments in California. Prop 27 is bad for Indian tribes and bad for Californians.

[Organization] joins more than 300 California Indian tribes, civil rights, educators, faith, business, labor public safety, elected officials, mental health experts and advocates for the homeless in OPPOSING Prop 27 because it:

- Severely increases the risks of underage and problem gambling, lacking critical safeguards to prevent underage gambling.
- Hurts California Indian tribes, driving business away from Indian casinos and disrupting safe, responsible gaming that has been operating on tribal lands for over 20 years.
- Shortchanges school and critical state priorities, sending 90% of profits into the pockets of out-of-state gambling corporations and sidestepping the general fund, preventing a single penny of tax revenues from going to state priorities like public schools, wildfire prevention or emergency response.

Option 2
